Report of the Second Edition of Myanmar Music Festival June 7-17, 2015





Overview

The second annual Myanmar Music Festival was held in Yangon from June 8th to 14th, featuring musicians from Taiwan, Switzerland, and the United States. The festival is organized in association with Myanmar's Ministry of Culture and United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), in celebration of the 70th anniversary of the United Nations. The week-long music festival attracted musicians, scholars, educators, and entrepreneurs, who participated in dozens of music performances, educational workshops, and panel discussions. Through the performances of music, events held in Yangon, Mandalay, Naypyidaw, Myitkyina, and Pyay share the common goals of respect, peace, tolerance, and sustainable development.

On June 14th, Renata Dessallien, UN Resident and Humanitarian Coordinator in Myanmar, as well as Diramore, Director of Music Department at National University of Arts and Culture, gave opening speeches at the celebration concert held at Yangon National Theatre. The spectacular response from the public also initiated the joint collaboration of 2015-2016 Myanmar Music Festival: A Southeast Asia Tour, with Myanmar's Ministry of Culture and the United Nations.

As a continuation from 2015, the Naypyidaw concert on June 18th was attended by Daw Aung San Suu Kyi and members of the National League for Democracy. At the concert, Daw Aung San Suu Kyi said the most urgent matter at hand for Myanmar is for various ethnic groups to arrive at the consensus of unity. She also described music as the best method of education, because music is not only a means of self-expression, it can also help reach consensus with others. Moreover, she expressed aspirations for future installments of Myanmar Music Festival to continue promote democracy, peace, and unity for Myanmar, through the work of music.

On June 8th and June 9th, the music festival kicked off at the American Center and the Embassy of Switzerland, respectively, with local students, embassy officials, and various civil groups in attendance.

Conflicts among ethnic groups and religions continue to plague Myanmar society. In order to promote understanding, respect, and trust among different groups, Music Festival's choir is formed. Working with international peace promotion organization, Children International Summer Village (CISV), choir membership consists of various ethnic groups, cultures, and religions. During the festival, choir members learnt mutual respect and understanding, as well as songs from different countries and languages, thereby achieving harmony through appreciating multiple cultures within music.

In addition, before and after the festival, organizers also arranged for musicians to perform at local hospitals, art galleries, and bookstores in cities around Yangon, including Mandalay, Myitkyina, and Pyay. For the local communities, these concerts provided residents a first-time opportunity to get to know Western Classical music and diverse cultures.

Myitkyina is the capital city of Kachin State. Since it's located near the border with China, ongoing conflicts have occurred in recent months. Kachin Theological College (KTC) is a followers-funded theological school. Musicians from the Myanmar Music Festival performed its first concert at the school.

Inclusion and Sustainable Development

Inclusive and Sustainable Development are United Nations' primary goals. At the time of celebrating the 70th anniversary of UN Charter, Myanmar Music Festival also collaborated with UNESCO, organized forum discussions on the topic of "Achieving Inclusive and Sustainable Development Through Arts." Hosted by Esuna Dugarova, participants include UN Resident and Humanitarian Coordinator in Myanmar, Renata Dessallien, Music Festival's Artistic Director Kim Gallagher, Associate Director Erina Iwasaki, social entrepreneur Austin Yoder, as well as Myanmar local artists. Forum topics include how to promote national development through arts, in-depth discussions on how to increase inclusion and sustainability within Myanmar Music Festival, as well as strive for a development direction compatible with the local societal atmosphere.

Myanmar Music Festival plans to work in association with Myanmar's Ministry of Culture and the United Nations, to jointly organize the 2015/2016 Southeast Asia Tour, which shall continue to promote the spirit of freedom, democracy, and peace throughout countries in Southeast Asia.

Conclusion

The festival performed a diversity of musical genres performed by a diverse group of musicians promoting cooperation, peace while empowering Myanmar Musicians to develop their skills as performers, speakers, and entrepreneurs. Audience reach included orphans in Pyay, students in Myitkyina, Myanmar general audience in Mandalay and Yangon, doctors and nurses at Parami hospital, and more. The National Theatre concert attracted an estimated 1400 people. The total number of visitors to the festival is estimated to 3000 people and we hope to keep growing our audience both in number and diversity.
